

Special Education Parent Advisory Council FAQs

What is the Special Education Parent Advisory Council (SEPAC)?

- SEPAC is a state-mandated, parent-run group working to promote a network of parents, guardians, and caregivers of children with special needs.
- SEPAC advises the district on matters that pertain to the education, health, and safety of students with special needs and disabilities from ages 3 to 22 years.

• Why SEPAC?

- Network with parents, guardians, and caregivers
- Share your own expertise and experiences
- Learn about the available services
- Learn to advocate for your child's needs
- Volunteer and bring excellence to the educational experience of all students

• When?

- SEPAC holds parent workshop about 4 times per school year. Workshops are typically after school at one of the Match School sites.
- Special Education staff will be reaching out to parents with specific information.

What topics are discussed?

- SEPAC works with specialists and school officials to provide workshops on topics of importance to parents.
- SEPAC will meet regularly with school and district administrators to participate in planning, developing, and evaluating the school's special education programs.
- Our first topic will be understanding parents' basic rights in special education.
